COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES:

History 4335 covers the history of Germany and conquered territories from 1933 to 1945. Topics include: the origins of the NSDAP, Hitler's rise to power, the Holocaust, the Second World War and the impact of the Nazi period on German cultural, social and political life. Students will read memoirs, and primary source documents, view both documentary and dramatic films, and engage in thoughtful discussion of the issues presented.

Citations must conform to The Chicago Manual of Style, or suffer a 20 point penalty .
